

UNIVERSITY SERMON

'A More Excellent Way?'

WELCOME

Welcome to this University Sermon. As with so many other Cambridge institutions and customs 'Sermons before the University' (to give them their proper title) have a very long history but have been adapted with the passing of time, as circumstances have changed. Today, these Sermons are an opportunity for leading clergy and lay members of different churches to provide comment on current issues from a religious perspective and to explore aspects of the Christian faith.

The practice of Sermons in the University Church dates back at least to the year 1300 and was recognized in the earliest University Statutes. Then, and for many years afterwards, there were many more Sermons than there are today: one must remember that in a world without newspapers and where books were scarce, the Sermon played a very different role. It was not until the latter part of the twentieth century that Sermons ceased to be delivered weekly during Term. There are now five University Sermons in Great St Mary's each year. A sermon is also preached at Mere's Commemoration in St Bene't's Church, and a Sermon before the University is preached in King's College.

Today's Preacher is **Dr Eeva John**. Born in Finland, Eeva has had a fairly itinerant life growing up in Finland, the USA and Switzerland, and working in Ethiopia and Sudan before eventually making her home in the UK with her husband, Rob.

Her career is best described as a multicoloured patchwork: from being а and lecturer researcher in organic chemistry to relief and development work, it was the experience of leading a community regeneration project that eventually drove her to her first love, namely the study of theology, which she pursued part time over a number of years at Wycliffe Hall, Oxford, and the London School of Theology.



Eeva has worked in three other theological colleges – Wycliffe Hall, Trinity College, Bristol, and Westcott House – as well as for the Ministry Division of the Church of England.

Eeva studied chemistry at Oxford University, where she also did her doctorate on the biosynthesis of penicillin. Much later, she completed a Diploma in Biblical and Theological Studies at Wycliffe Hall and a Masters in Biblical Interpretation at the London School of Theology. She also has completed qualifications in Group Facilitation Methods and Participatory Strategic Planning.

Eeva's interest is in the pedagogy of theological education in its widest sense. She hopes to stimulate the church in exploring creative and transformational approaches to learning for discipleship and ministry.

In 2021 Eeva was awarded a Lambeth Doctorate of Divinity in recognition of her work as Enabling Officer for *Living in Love and Faith*.
