About the conference

Thank you for booking to attend this conference, and welcome to Great St Mary's Church. Thirty years into women's priestly ministry, we focus today on women's voices and the fruit of their work today, in ministry, scholarship and creativity. We hope that you will feel able to bring and share with one another your stories, and leave with our song of hope renewed.

Please find below some practical information.

Parking/arrival

The nearest public car park is at the Grand Arcade shopping centre. Please note that traffic in central Cambridge can be very busy, so allow plenty of time for your journey. If you are coming by train, please allow plenty of time to travel from the station to the Church.

Taxi – the closest drop off points are outside the Arts Theatre or by the Cambridge University Press bookshop (each is c.2 minutes' walk from the entrance to the church).

If dropping people off at the church, please come along Trinity Street before 10am and after 4pm. For satnav please put in Cambridge University Press bookshop to be guided to the right place.

There are some disabled parking spaces outside the Arts Theatre (please note that because of the barrier by the Corpus Clock being lowered during the day, it is not possible to leave the disabled spaces in King's Parade in the daytime).

Coffee and lunch arrangements

We will be serving tea and coffee at 9.30 as delegates arrive and register, between optional morning prayer and the opening session.

A simple vegetarian lunch will be served in the church (soup, roll and fruit). Please let us know if you have any other dietary requirements, by emailing us at office@gsm.cam.ac.uk

Toilets

We have limited toilet facilities in the church. There are further facilities at Michaelhouse in Trinity Street and in the Grand Arcade and local shops / cafés.

Speakers

Revd Dr Isabelle Hamley, Principal of Ridley Hall

Unexpected things in unexpected places: the strange ways of God, women and the Church of England

Isabelle Hamley is currently principal of Ridley Hall. She is a speaker, writer and broadcaster who is passionate about Scripture and how it can shape the life of the church. She has previously held posts as a university chaplain, parish priest, chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury and theological adviser to the House of Bishops. She has written widely on issues of justice and violence, and on faith and mental health.

Rt Revd Dr Rosemarie Mallett, Bishop of Croydon Race, Racism and Hope

The Right Revd Dr Rosemarie Mallett was born in Barbados but has lived much of her life in the UK. She has worked in West and East Africa, the Caribbean and the UK as an academic researcher. She then trained for ordained ministry, and since 2004 has served as an ordained minister in the Diocese of Southwark. She now serves as the Bishop of Croydon. She is a Fellow of Westminster Abbey Institute and a Visiting Fellow of Jesus College Cambridge.

Lizzie Hensman and Emily Rumble Researching the Ministry of Women (at Lambeth Palace Library)

Lizzie and Emily are archivists at Lambeth Palace Library where they recently curated 'Women and the Church of England'. This exhibition used Library records to highlight the vital role women have played in the Church of England in the last 200 hundred years and to mark three important anniversaries: 80 years since the ordination of Florence Li Tim-Oi, 30 years of women being ordained as priests in the Church of England, and the passing of the Bishops and Priests (Consecration and Ordination of Women) Measure ten years ago.

Revd Christina Rees CBE, Li Tim-Oi Foundation

What would equal look like?

Christina is a writer and broadcaster and was a leading campaigner for women's ordination in the Church of England. She was a spokesperson for the Movement for the Ordination of Women and then chair of National WATCH (Women and the Church) for over 13 years. Christina was a member of General Synod for 25 years and a founder member of the Archbishops' Council. Her books include 'Voices of This Calling', a collection of the experiences of the first generation of women priests and The Divine Embrace. She is the Director of the Li Tim-Oi Foundation, a charity that gives grants for education to Christian women across the Anglican Communion enabling them to follow their vocations. Christina speaks and preaches widely in the UK, US and across the Communion. She lives in North Norfolk and is on the ministry team of St Peter's Church, Sheringham.

Revd Dr Victoria Johnson, Dean, St John's College, Cambridge

The Priest finds her voice: the sacrament and our sound

Victoria is Dean of Chapel of St John's College, Cambridge. Prior to ordination training she was a cancer research scientist. She trained for priesthood at Westcott House and read Theology and Religious Studies at Cambridge University and Yale Divinity School. She was ordained in 2007, served her title in the parish of St John the Divine, Baguley, then was Priestin-Charge of St Michael's, Flixton. From 2015 she was a Residentiary Canon at Ely Cathedral combining the portfolios of mission and pastoral care and in 2020 was appointed Canon Precentor of York Minster. She has taught Liturgy and Homiletics to ordinands and lay readers on local training courses in the North West, and has served on national church bodies in the areas of mission, public affairs, environment and evangelism and is a Trustee of Westcott House. She has recently published her first book, On Voice: Speech, Song, Silence, Human and Divine (DLT, 2024)
