Order of Service

Welcome to Great St Mary's. Wherever you have come from, and whoever you are, consider yourself at home here with us. If this is your first time here, please introduce yourself to a minister after the service.

Ash Wednesday is the English name for the first day of Lent, stemming from the tradition of making the sign of the cross, in ash, as a sign of penitence.

Sorrow for our sins – penitence – is the key theme of this service, and takes a central place in the liturgy as a response to scripture and preaching. The use of ash, a feature of this day in the Western church since at least the tenth century, is a powerful symbol of sorrow for our sins, a reminder of our frailty and, ultimately, our mortality. The words used at the imposition of ashes ('Remember that you are dust') take us back to the creation stories in Genesis, remionding us of our dependence on God, and our failure as human beings to be faithful to his love.

Here in this church you are among friends and we hope that you feel at home. Whether you come as a regular member, or as a visitor of any faith or none, we welcome you today and pray that you may know something of the love of God during this act of worship.

THE LENT PROSE

Everyone **KNEELS** or remains **SEATED** as the ministers enter. Please join in the refrain of the Lent Prose, a hymn dating back to 10th century Spain:



Hear us, O Lord, have mer-cy up-on us: For we have sinned a -gainst Thee.

To thee, Redeemer, on thy throne of glory, lift we our weeping eyes in holy pleadings; listen, O Jesu, to our supplications. [Refrain]

O thou chief Corner-stone, Right hand of the Father: Way of Salvation, Gate of Life Celestial: cleanse thou our sinful souls from all defilement: [Refrain]

God, we implore thee, in thy glory seated, bow down and hearken to thy weeping children; pity and pardon all our grievous trespasses. [Refrain]

Sins oft committed now we lay before thee: with true contrition, now no more we veil them; grant us, Redeemer, loving absolution. [Refrain]

Innocent, captive, taken unresisting: falsely accused, and for us sinners sentenced, save us, we pray thee, Jesus our Redeemer. [Refrain]

The president greets the people

INTRODUCTION

The president explains the meaning of Lent and invites the people to observe it faithfully

Brothers and sisters in Christ: since early days Christians have observed with great devotion the time of our Lord's passion and resurrection and prepared for this by a season of penitence and fasting.

By carefully keeping these days, Christians take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness proclaimed in the gospel, and so grow in faith and in devotion to our Lord.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy word.

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made and forgive the sins of all those who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may receive from you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

SELF-EXAMINATION AND CONFESSION

The president says

Let us now call to mind our sin and the infinite mercy of God.

The deacon leads

God the Father,

All have mercy on us.

God the Son,

All have mercy on us.

God the Holy Spirit,

All have mercy on us.

Trinity of love,

All have mercy on us.

Most merciful God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength.

We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven.

All Lord have mercy.

We have been deaf to your call to serve, as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.

We confess to you, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives,

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people,

All Lord have mercy.

Our anger at our own frustration, and our envy of those more fortunate than ourselves,

All Lord have mercy.

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work,

All Lord have mercy.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us,

All Lord have mercy.

Accept our repentance, Lord for the wrongs we have done, for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty,

All Accept our repentance, Lord.

For all false judgments, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbours, and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us,

All Accept our repentance, Lord.

For our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us,

- All Accept our repentance, Lord.
 - Restore us, good Lord, and let your anger depart from us;
- All Favourably hear us, for your mercy is great.
 - Accomplish in us the work of your salvation,
- All That we may show your glory in the world.
 - By the cross and passion of your Son our Lord,
- All Bring us with all your saints to the joy of his resurrection.

Silence

THE IMPOSITION OF ASHES

The president says

Dear friends in Christ, I invite you to receive these ashes as a sign of the spirit of penitence with which we shall keep this season of Lent.

The president blesses the ashes, made from the palm crosses from previous year's Palm Sunday.

God our Father, you create us from the dust of the earth. Grant that these ashes may be for us a sign of our penitence and a symbol of our mortality; for it is by your grace alone that we receive eternal life in Jesus Christ our Saviour.

All Amen.

The president and ministers are marked with ash, and you are invited to come forward to be marked with ash as directed by the stewards.

The following is said to each person who receives the imposition of ashes

Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ. Miserere mei, Deus, secundum magnam misericordiam tuam;

et secundum multitudinem miserationum tuarum, dele iniquitatem meam. Have mercy upon me, O God, after thy great goodness: according to the multitude of thy mercies do away mine offences.

After the imposition the president and ministers wash their hands, and SILENCE is kept.

The president says

God our Father, the strength of all who put their trust in you, mercifully accept our prayers; and because, in our weakness, we can do nothing good without you, grant us the help of your grace, that in keeping your commandments we may please you, both in will and deed; through Jesus Christ our Lord.


PRAYER OF PREPARATION


On the night before he died he had supper with his friends and, taking bread, he praised you. He broke the bread, gave it to them and said: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

When supper was ended he took the cup of wine. Again he praised you, gave it to them and said: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Father, we remember all that Jesus did, in him we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross. Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.
